

Question from July "I have a 4 year old Northstar Cherry tree that was doing great up until last fall. The trunk of the tree has now split and most of the tree looks dead. Has anyone experienced this? If anyone has any ideas on how to bring this poor tree back to life, I'd really appreciate hearing from you."



Response from Cindy Flanders:

Take a burlap sack and cut it down the middle. Tie the sack tight just below the split on the tree trunk, fill the sack with bark mulch and tie the top of the sack above the split on the trunk. Keep the sack moist. (Note: I tried this shortly after Cindy called me in July - the tree has since come back to life and is full of new green leaves - it even started to bloom recently!!! Thank you Cindy!)



The 31st Annual Terry Fox Run is coming to Wasa!

July 11, 2011 (Port Coquitlam, BC) – After raising \$20,000 since inception in 2005, the village of Wasa was absent from *The Terry Fox Run for Cancer Research* last year. On Sunday September 18th, *The Wasa Terry Fox Run* is set to make a comeback.

"We are so pleased and feel so fortunate to have such a positive and enthusiastic Run Organizer take on this challenge," states Donna White, Provincial Director of the BC/Yukon Division of The Terry Fox Foundation. "The community of Wasa will once again be able to take part in what has become a tradition for communities across the country and around the world."

Leading the charge for the *Wasa Terry Fox Run* revival is Lynne Davis, a woman whose family and loved ones have a long-history of being plagued by this terrible disease. "*I feel so helpless when someone is suffering and there is nothing you can do,*" explains the new Wasa Run Organizer, Lynne Davis. "*When I saw the article in the paper saying there was no one to organize the Terry Fox Run in Wasa, I thought this is something I can do. In my own small way maybe I can make a difference.*"

The run will start and finish at the Wasa Community Centre and Recreation Grounds, located at the North end of Wasa Lake. Registration begins at 9:30 AM with the run scheduled to start at 11:00 AM. There will be 2 km, 5 km and 10 km courses available, so people of all abilities can choose their distance. Runners, walkers and cyclists are welcome to come out and enjoy the scenic and fully accessible Lions Trail which winds its way around the lake and yes, well-behaved dogs on leashes are welcome.



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ST MARY LAKE DEVELOPMENT

In the July RDEK Board meeting we gave first and second readings and in August, third reading to amend the Rural Kimberley Official Community Plan and the Zoning Bylaw. These amendments will facilitate subdivision to create 15 rural residential lots and will include a 15 acre park which will be donated to the RDEK. I wish to thank Tembec and the St. Mary Valley Rural Resident Association for working together and coming up with this plan. There was also a Public Hearing on July 21, where no one spoke against the application.

INVASIVE PLANTS

The RDEK Board sent a letter to the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure,Environment and Forest Lands and Natural Resource Operations to address the long standing problem of invasive plants on Crown Land.

HOME BASED BUSINESS REGULATIONS

The RDEK will be updating and revising Home Based Business Regulations. There will be a comprehensive public consultation, so everyone is encouraged to provide their input.

On July 5 the Official Community Plan and Zoning for Baynes Lake was adopted by the Board.

MOSQUITO CONTROL

As a result of the very wet and cold spring and early summer, the Board passed a motion to review the budget allotment for mosquito control in the Ta Ta Creek. Skookumchuk and Wasa Lake areas. I received many calls about the mosquitoes this summer and I realize how frustrated everyone was. Kendra worked very hard but unfortunately could not treat the Bummers Flats area which was where a large number of the mosquitoes came from. There will be a public meeting early this fall to discuss Mosquito Control and aquifer testing, I encourage everybody to try to attend. Mark your calendars for the Public Meeting on Monday, October 3rd at the Wasa Hall at 7pm.

OFFICIAL COMMUNITY PLAN

In 2012, the RDEK Board is planning revisions and updating to the Ta Ta Creek, Skookumchuk, Sheep Creek and Wasa Official Community Plan. One of the questions we will ask you to consider is: "Do you wish to see development in your area. If so, where would you prefer the development location and what is your preference as far as lot or acreage size? There will be many opportunities for public consultation and discussion and the above is an example of the monthly questions I will be asking you to think about. THE PERRY CREEK STEAMSHOVEL

The 1901 model Steam Shovel built by Vulcan Iron Works, Toledo, Ohio now sits near the railway station of Fort Steele Heritage Town. This close relation to a railway locomotive arrived at Wanklyn (Wycliffe)

October in 1902. The crew assigned to move her 18 miles up a newly cleared road beside Perry Creek had four pairs of steel rails which they laid. moved the machine to the end, set brake, ripped

up three pairs of rails and laid these forward, moved, and repeated over and over again. Some steep spots offered extra challenge needing a jack. Later snow and frost slowed all work. The machine was left idle for the winter.

Once spring came the new machine had to be set at a desired site, and sluice boxes built to sit nearby. The weight of the machine on its short track soon had it sinking into the sand or gravel bed. The operators slowly learned how to position this machine so that its big boom could scoop, swing to dump in adjacent sluice boxes, then swing to dig again.

The steam shovel needed many cords of dry wood to fire the

boilers. Possibly worked а crew over the winter harvest first to dead trees then firewood. other It appears that the smokestacks were elongated (probably to minimize getting sparks to surrounding scrub, dead grass

or timber). There was a cab for the operator and huge boilers (which have been removed in recent years by collectors) sitting on the rail car base. It was a curiosity when it arrived. Throughout 1903 many off duty miners or Fort Steele citizens came out to view the unusual procedure. Now it may be viewed (without paying to enter the park,) standing tall and proud despite its rust and missing parts. This is the only known surviving steam shovel on rails in Canada.

Words of Wisdom

No Longer Be Afraid

Fear is the most stressful emotion because it paralyzes objectivity and clarity of mind, and makes you see reality as it is not. Fear focuses on what you do not want to happen, what you judge to be unacceptable in your life. Most people spend their entire life fighting against what they call "the worst", that which they think will prevent them from being completely happy. In an ordinary mind, fear is dominant and unconsciously controls one's every action, even the action of thinking.

To do so, learn to say "Yes" to what is as it is, before taking any action, so that you respond to the necessity of the situation rather than wanting the situation to be different or as you would like it to be. At any moment, nothing can be different from what it is; accept that once and for all to free yourself from all conflicts.

Takeyour fear into consideration L in any situation, and then accept the situation as it is to quiet your mind and to be able to act properly, rather than reacting inappropriately because you refuse the situation.

From there, you will discover that fear was your only true enemy and that you can overcome it easily by accepting more and refusing less. To act correctly, stop reacting and be free from fear.

May all good things be granted to you, since you will face all situations, good and bad, in a balanced manner!

2011 Mosquito Control Program Update



Mosquito Season 2011: The Perfect Storm

This year was really the perfect storm for mosquitoes.

We had high snow loads, a cool and wet spring and sustained high flood waters. It was the most challenging year of mosquito control that our contractor Kendra Lewis of Morrow Bioscience Ltd. has experienced in 13 years.


Kendra and her team have been working very hard all season to combat the mosquitoes. This newsletter will provide an update on the control efforts that have taken place and how you can help as the late summer hatch continues.

Thousands of Hectares Treated

As of July 13, Morrow had treated over 2,460 hectares since it began control treatments in May.

These treatments have been completed by Kendra and her assistant either by hand using a backpack blower or aerially via helicopter & hopper.

To give you an idea of the magnitude of the treatment required this year, in 2010, less than 275 hectares were treated over the <u>entire</u> field season.




Above: the chart above shows the

In 2011, we have treated an area <u>9</u> times larger than in 2010!

Separating <u>FACT</u> from MYTH

MYTH: The reason there are so many mosquitoes this year is that the RDEK ran out of money. This is absolutely false.

<u>FACT</u>: A lack of money was not a reason for the mosquitoes. The wet spring/summer and high water are to blame. Although we did exceed our forecast budget, we utilized reserve funds and will continue to treat the area as required.

MYTH: The product we used (Aquabac 200G) is ineffective, causing the bad mosquito problem. This is also false.

<u>FACT</u>: Our contractor does a very good job of making timely and thorough treatments in waters within the service area. Having said that, we cannot realistically target every single water source within the control area, so some larvae are missed. However, most of the mosquitoes that people experienced in 2011 hatched outside of the Mosquito Control Service Area or in areas of the service area that we cannot treat (i.e. Bummers Flats) and were 'blown in' once they hatched as adults.

Treatment is Continuing

While control of flood water mosquito species is now complete, Morrow Bioscience Ltd. will be completing some larviciding treatments of the mosquito species that emerge in late-summer, stagnant water.

The contractor will continue to monitor the situation in our Service Area for as long as needed.



Treatment Methods: Targeting Larvae

The Mosquito Control Program targets the larvae. Sites containing larvae are treated with a granular mosquito larvicide called Aquabac 200G.

This larvicide contains a naturally occurring bacterium known as Bti, which targets mosquito larvae, but does not harm people, birds, mammals, beneficial insects or amphibians.



Keeping You Informed

One of the greatest challenges of the program is that we are not permitted to treat Bummer's Flats Conservation Lands. Southerly winds routinely blow mosquitoes into Wasa from this untreated area which has an impact on our larviciding efforts.

The larvicide is applied by hand using back pack blowers and by air using a helicopter.

Given the high number of mosquitoes this year, the RDEK did look into the possibility of using fog or adulticide to kill adult mosquitoes.

The use of adulticides is something the RDEK takes very seriously. After careful consideration it was decided not to pursue this form of mosquito control, at this time. Landowners play a key role in any effective mosquito control efforts and eliminating mosquitoes <u>before</u> they emerge as adults.

The best way to stop mosquitoes before they start is to remove all sources of standing water from around your home. Some great places to look include:

- Clogged gutters
- Old tires
- Trays under flower pots

- Outside pet dishes
- Kid's pools and toys
- Bird baths and feeders
- Canoes / boats

Once mosquitoes have hatched, landowners should keep grass cut at a short length and refrain from watering. These actions will help to reduce key mosquito habitats.

A meeting will be held for residents to learn more about and ask questions related to our 2011 Mosquito Control Program, sometime in the fall.
