From the Ashram Words of Wisdom

IS YOUR RELIGION OR YOUR FAITH THE BEST AND TRUEST ONE?

It is common to believe that, because one subscribes to a certain doctrine or religious belief, it is necessarily the best and the truest one, while all the others are not as good or as truthful.

Since we strive at the Ashram to spread a message of tolerance and acceptance concerning all the Faces of God, I would like to share with you a short Buddhist story that was told to me by my own Master, Shri Swami Hamsananda Sarasvati, many decades ago, a story that has really helped me to go beyond tolerance through acceptance.

Here is this story: Several citizens got into a heated argument about God and the different religions, and none could agree to a common answer. So they came to the Lord Buddha to find out exactly what God looked like.

The Buddha asked his disciples to get a magnificent, large elephant and four blind men. He then brought the blind men to the elephant and told them to find out what the elephant "looked" like.

The first man touched the elephant's leg and reported that the elephant "looked" like a pillar. The second man touched the elephant's tummy and said that an elephant was like a wall. The third blind man touched the elephant's ear and said that it was a piece of cloth. The fourth man held the tail and described the elephant as a piece of rope. And all of them ran into a heated argument about the "appearance" of the elephant.

The Buddha asked the citizens: "The four blind men touched the elephant, but each of them gives a different description of the animal. Which answer is right?"

"All of them are right," was the reply.

"Why? Because everyone can only see part of the elephant. They are not able to see the whole animal. The same applies to God and religions. No one will see Him completely." By this parable, the Lord Buddha teaches that we should respect all other legitimate religions and their beliefs.

In the same way, it is good to enlarge the vision that one has about the Divine and to include in that vision the faith of all those that do not directly share one's own religious belief.

No matter what, it is certain that the merciful Divine is One and the same for all beings. If we belong to God, God does not belong to us.

May your faith and your prayers join, in spirit, the faiths and prayers of all men and women united in the principle of Unity and Oneness of God.



THE MAN WHO BUILT THE WINDSOR HOTEL

Robert Mather was only fourteen when he was sent from Victoria to Walla Walla to join a pack train bringing supplies to Wild Horse Creek. His obituary, written by PROSPECTOR editor A,B. Grace, tells us that young Robert came in with supplies each spring, assisted an aunt with a small store during the summer, and returned to Victoria to go to school in the winter. When he was nineteen his aunt died. Robert inherited the store and a small ranch at Cherry Creek. He worked in the East Kootenay each summer and returned to Victoria in the winter until he found a bride. In January 1882 he married Mary Jane Dalgardno in Port Townsend, Washington. They trekked with a pack train to Galbraith's Ferry (later named Fort Steele) as soon as the trail was passable. Those horses were his to use for future freighting contracts here in this district.

Robert pre-empted land adjacent to his Cherry Creek Ranch, expanding from 100 - 1000 acres. He built his own cable ferry across the Kootenav River about six miles upriver from John Galbraith's pay ferry and he brought in a portable sawmill to make lumber from the trees cut while clearing his ranch. When his sea captain father delivered a small herd of Scottish long horned cattle to Hope, Robert hired Ktunaxa men to drive the cattle over the Dewdney Trail to Cherry Creek. Every single animal arrived safely.

Robert vacillated between the ranch and Fort Steele. He moved his sawmill closer to town to create lumber to build a hotel. The HOTEL DALGARDNO opened in early 1894. Next, Robert had his ranch surveyed into building lots to become Dalgardno City. In October he moved his family out to a new log home and sublet the managing of the hotel and restaurant in town. No lots sold at his dream location. A fire damaged the Cherry Creek house so after a few months they were back in town.

Mary Jane was a good wife in those pioneering years. She fed hired hands, helped make hay, grew a small garden, kept a milk cow and some chickens, and raised a big family. She travelled to the home of her parents in Port Townsend for the delivery of her first two babies. When she returned via train to Golden, she was met by a Ktunaxa lady who carried the infant the rest of the way home. Robert and Mary Jane were community minded. A temporary stage was erected in their hotel dining room for school Christmas concerts directed by Miss They also hosted some Bailey. lovely dinners and dances, usually with a Scottish theme.

Robert spearheaded the formation of the Fort Steele Mining Association, a forerunner of the Board of Trade. In 1897 the population exploded. Mather doubled the size of the hotel, changed the name to WINDSOR, and built a livery stable and ice house behind. His brother Harry joined him to help in the hotel as bar keeper and when the Presbyterians obtained a resident minister, Robert Mather was on the committee to build their church. Mary Jane led the ladies auxiliary raising funds for the new building.

Robert had become a Mason at age twenty one and was delighted to become a founding member of North Star Lodge # 30.

Robert Duncan Mather died May 16, 1908 and was laid to rest beside his son Earl who had drowned four years earlier. One newspaper extended sympathy to Mrs. Mather and six daughters, while the other said, "Robert is survived by his wife and seven daughters." Either way, Robert and Mary Jane did their bit to keep the new school viable.
