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Now and Then

Well that someone was the Great Rocket Richard-the most revered hockey player to have ever laced up a pair of skates for Les Habitants. A strong argument can be made that the Rocket was the most popular French Canadian ever. Maurice The Rocket Richard stood there like a giant asking me questions about hockey and whatever---I can't remember the • exact words because I was in a world of awe. He graciously signed an autograph for me (my first and most important ever-now unfortunately long gone) • and proceeded to carry on a conversation with his • buddies. An interesting sidebar to this anecdote is • that the arena in which this took place was called the • Villeray arena-now currently appropriately called The • Maurice Richard Arena-home of next years' Scotties Tournament Of Hearts curling championships. The

Rocket's funeral was a state affair attended by hundreds of thousands with millions more watching on television.-a true testament to the mans' life and existence. I give you this story as a reminder that yesteryears' pros are but a fleeting glimpse into the world of professional sports where the dollar is almighty and the camaraderie and trust that existed between fan and athlete has long vanished. Now the pro wants money for his signature and you have to go through an entourage to even say hello to your hero. I understand that the requests put upon these pros are numerous and that they don't have time for every social function, but a young fan seeking an autograph and a couple of minutes of voice time is the making of idols and heros. Todays' youth is left with pompous and ego driven sports idols to follow and admire. The definition of idol is false god-fortunately I and all the youngsters of my era had real gods to look up to and admire. The charitable work of todays' pros are well documented and admired, but in a lot of cases these events are orchestrated beforehand and very media driven and attended. I know that the old days were pre I pod. Twitter, Facebook and internet but do todays' heroes have to be so safe guarded? I say to them-lighten up and enjoy your fans. If you are concerned about your well being and life-I remind you that there were more assassinations back then than there are now. It seems that the breakdown of people friendly pros is directly proportionate to earning dollars: This is a top ten list of least liked professional athletes:

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5 YEAR FINANCIAL PLAN

The board adopted the RDEK's Five Year Financial Plan. The 2013 budget is \$24.7 million which represents an overall increase of \$600,000.00 from last year. The rates may vary between the electoral areas and municipalities. On average rural residential property within the RDEK will see an approximate 1.3% overall increase on their tax levy.

HOME BASED BUSINESS REGULATIONS

The Board has decided to proceed with the preparation of formal bylaws to amend home based business regulations in all electoral areas and to add a new "major" home based business category in Electoral Area A and C. If the board approves the amendments the public hearings will be held later this year.

CHERRY CREEK FALLS

I would like to thank Bill Bennett, MLA and Doug Clovechok (who is running for the Liberal party in the Columbia River - Revelstoke area) for all of their help in obtaining the rights to build an Area E Park. I would also like to congratulate the Meodowbrook Community Association on successfully raising the \$51,000.00 required to purchase the mining tenure for the Cherry Creek Falls Area. This area has been used recreationally by many people for many years and now will remain available for people to continue to recreate and enjoy.

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RHUBARB PUDDING

3 c. Rhubarb, chopped

¾ c. sugar

1/4 c. flaked coconut

1 tsp. baking powder

1/4 tsp. mace

3/4 c. sugar

6

1 tsp. orange zest

½ c. orange juice, heated to boiling

3 tbsp. butter

½ c. coarsely-crushed corn flakes

3/4 c. sifted all-purpose flour

1/4 tsp. salt

½ c. milk

1 tbsp. cornstarch

1/4 tsp. salt

pouring cream

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Butter a glass baking dish about 8x8x2 inches. Put rhubarb in prepared baking dish.

Combine butter and ¾ c. sugar. Add cereal flakes and coconut.

Sift flour, baking powder, ¼ tsp. salt and mace together. Add to butter-sugar mixture alternately with milk. Drop by small spoonfuls on top of rhubarb and spread as evenly as possible.

Combine ¾ c. sugar, cornstarch, orange zest and ¼ tsp. salt and sprinkle over batter. Pour boiling orange juice over all.

Bake about 45 minutes or until cake part springs back when touched lightly and rhubarb is tender. Serve hot with pouring cream.

WASA LAKE LAND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT (WLLID)

The Annual General Meeting of the Wasa Lake Land Improvement District will be held on Wednesday April 3, 2013 at the Wasa Community Hall at 7:00 PM.

The regular business of an AGM such as a review of operations and financials for the previous year and the election of a board member will be conducted. There is one vacancy to be filled this year for a three year term. BC residents who are taxpayers to the WLLID are entitled These same qualified to vote. electors who want to take an active part serving in an organization with deep and important roots in the community are encouraged to stand for election to the board.

In response to the flood of 2012, the WLLID has engaged McElhanney Consulting, who are engineers and land surveyors, to conduct a review of the flooding event and make recommendations on how we might mitigate further flooding. They have produced a preliminary report, a copy of which is available at http://www. wasalake.com/WLLID/A-Study.pdf for downloading. (Downloading stuff never seems universally perfect - the document downloads and reads fine with the Chrome and IE9 browsers. IE10 gave error messages and couldn't render the first page, but the rest was fine.)

An earlier 1987 report authored by Ric Baker, an engineer with the Water Management Branch of the BC government is available at the Wasa Library. It is very readable and gives a broad background to flooding in the Wasa area. In what came to be known as "the Baker Report", he recommended the installation of the flap gate system we currently have in place preventing overland flow from the Kootenay River. It was used and referenced by the McElhanney study and is great background material.



HISTORY BYTES

LOWERY - A PIONEER EDITOR

"Colonel" Robert T. Lowery came to British Columbia in 1893 at the age of 32. He had been in the newspaper business with his brother in Petrolia, Ontario and tried his luck as creator and editor of newspapers in a dozen Kootenay communities. Lowery was barely 5 feet tall, always well dressed, sporting a neat goatee and moustache. He smoked "two bit "cigars and had no military experience to justify the title of "colonel". In those days of one man newspaper production he sought his own news and advertising, set type by hand, printed on a small portable press, delivered the weekly by hand or mail, and was soon recognized by all local citizens.


Lowery's first newspaper was The Kaslo Claim. That lasted only 16 weeks as silver prices plummeted and subscribers moved away. The final issue of The Claim became a collector's item because most commercial advertisements were printed upside down, indicating non payment, or sideways, showing partial payment.

Next Lowery moved to Nakusp where the paper became The Ledge. Late in 1894 Lowery and The Ledge moved to New Denver. Two years later an American purchased The Ledge. Now the ambitious editor could start The Sandon Paystreak at a time when things were booming. His editorials advocated safer working conditions for miners." The miner is the backbone of every mining camp. His pay supports all businesses and capital investment. He gets \$3.50 a day for pounding a drill in the darkness. He is occasionally assisted up the Golden Stairs by a premature blast, or sometimes by a snowslide. All buildings of the mines should be built to obviate danger from slides." Another theme was religion. In his TRUTH & HUMOR" column he spoke of his own observation or his own Creed. "Fear and superstition is not religion. Belief without proof is not religion. Faith without fact is not religion. Religion is to love justice and mercy, to pity the suffering, to assist the weak, to forget wrongs and remember benefits, to fight slavery of every kind, to make a happy home, to discard error, destroy prejudice, cultivate hope, to do the best that can be done, and then be resigned. This is the religion of reason, the creed of science, which satisfies the heart and brain." Along my trail there are no costly churches built by people who live in poverty, and whose children often suffer for food, let alone education, while bishops and lesser clerical lights live on the tenderloin steaks of the land."

The criticisms of mine owners taking short cuts endangering workers, CPR practices and complaints about mail service had his newspapers barred from being sold on passenger trains. Later, when he had settled in Greenwood Lowery chose to declare war on the Post Office. "The officials behind the stamps in Ottawa are carried away with the mad desire to make the post office pay dividends just as though it was a grocery store or a pawnbroker's skinnery. In order to do this they pay miserable wages to many of the employees, sell stamps printed on almost rotten paper and have tortoise movement. Look at the mail service between Phoenix and Greenwood. As a slow thing it has the millennium(1900) backed over dump. The distance between towns is barely five miles (8 km) yet it takes letters so long to pass between those copper cities that stamps are mildewed by the time a letter reaches its destination. "This outburst had him barred from using the Post Office but the ban was soon lifted because he promised "to behave himself."

Editor Lowery had a long visit in Ontario then moved to Fernie, Nelson, Poplar, Princeton, then to Greenwood for fourteen years. Like many newspapermen he was a two fisted drinker and occasionally ended up

in hospital to "dry out". If he missed an edition a news item might state "Colonel Lowery was discharged from hospital this week-for the same old thing." He was very clever with words. This bachelor editor has left us some of the most entertaining descriptions of life in mining camps, and glimpses of the lives of gamblers, prostitutes, miners, business people and ordinary citizens who populated the communities. He sold his Greenwood paper in 1920 and moved to Grand Forks where he died in May 1921. He requested that his funeral be held in Nelson. Hundreds turned out to say farewell to the old wordsmith who left us a rich legacy on paper.


