Head coach Roman Vopat brings his experience and knowledge to a very talented laden team and the results are evident with the on-ice product being displayed by the boys.

The coaching staff has the team playing a disciplined style of hockey with a emphasis on positional play and learning the roles of each player on the ice at any given time and blending that into a breakout and counterattack program. This style can be taught to a hard working and good skating team which the Dynamiters possess this year. At press time the team currently sits 2nd in the Eddy Mountain division of the KIJHL to their archrivals the Fernie Ghostriders.





APPROVED APPLICATIONS

To date applications have been approved on behalf of Area E individuals for educational assistance for various courses: Wasa Quilting Guild for their Festival and workshops, and the Wasa Recreation Society for Community Hall maintenance and upgrades.

AVAILABLE FUNDING

Grants from June 1st 2011 to May 31st 2012 are available in three broad areas.

- A. Community activities and facilities
- B. Youth and adult educational assistance
- C. Youth and adult health and recreation

Last year the programme assisted 31 Area E groups or individuals for a variety of activities within the above broad areas.

The Memorial Garden, The Wasa Library and the Tri Village Buzz News will be presenting applications shortly. Funding is available in the scholarship area for eligible Area E youth and adults attending university, college, technical courses and upgrading. We can assist in the costs of Area E residents who have taken or plan to take certified self interest courses between June 30th 2011 and May 31st 2012. Some examples are computer literacy, first aid, art, craft, health and wellness, safety and photography.

During the October board meeting, the RDEK Board supported the Yost Referral to the Agricultural Land Commission for subdivision located at 4470 Moan Road in the Skookumchuck area. The application proposes to create 6 residential lots approximately 1 hector in size. They have agreed to place a covenant on title indicating no duplexes. They also advised the board that the existing gravel pit would be closed and reclaimed.

WASA TOWN HALL MEETING

Mrs. Levett of Fort Steele

Frances Alice Richardson came from Detroit via CPR to Golden, took the riverboat to Invermere where she was met by Charles Levett, whisked to the Stoddart's Hotel where a bachelor Reverend conducted their marriage ceremony on June 17th, 1891. The stage driver and Charles' brother witnessed the event. The couple then took the stage to Fort Steele. Their courtship was conducted by mail at a time when postal service to East Kootenay was only once a month. Charles had been in the district since 1882. He began as a pack train helper to Robert Galbraith and in 1889 built and operated the very first hotel, Steele House.

Mrs. Levett, likely the fifth white woman in the community, threw herself into making the hotel an attractive place. She participated in whatever community events were happening. The couple ran the hotel for a few years. Later they built a large boarding house on Riverside Avenue and sold the hotel just before the 1897 boom.

One of the boarders at this "Clean and Comfortable" place was John Campbell, a lawyer from Victoria. He opted to live there while a home was being built for his family. Unfortunately Campbell died suddenly despite attention from Dr. Watt. There was no undertaker so Mrs. Levett tenderly washed and dressed the body, then set it into a coffin made by James Grassick, the carpenter. The gentleman was the second person buried in the current Fort Steele Cemetery.

1897 was a year of expansion and change. Citizens declared that they needed a hospital. Mrs. Levett, Mrs. Bleasdell, Mrs. Binmore and Miss Bailey canvassed the community and district for funds. Robert Galbraith donated six lots and soon a rudimentary building with an office, a six bed ward, a private room, a kitchen and nurse's room stood ready to handle sick and injured locals. When there were patients and staff in place Mrs. Levett donated milk and butter to the hospital.

Some winters it was cold with scant snow. A lagoon near the current CPR switching yard often froze to tempt locals to strap skates onto their boots and skate on the smooth ice. Mrs. Levett enjoyed skating. One day Mr. Carlin, store owner, challenged her to a race upriver and back. Observers appointed Mr. Levett to referee. Other skaters lined the proposed path and cheered as the fattest lady challenged the stoutest man in town. The referee declared it was a tie!

Mrs. Levett joined the Anglican congregation while it was conducted in the first schoolhouse under Lay Reader Robert Galbraith. In the fall of 1898 Reverend Charles Procunier moved to Fort Steele as the Anglican minister. He soon began conducting a Confirmation class for three adults, Mrs. Levett, Mrs. McVittie, his wife Jessie Procunier (who had been raised as a Methodist), and a teen aged boy, Herb Clark.

Charles Levett suffered for over twenty years with a muscular degenerative disease. Near the end he was totally bedridden. He passed away in October 1930. His wife cared for him to the end and still kept the boarding house at readiness for any possible tenant. Mrs. Levett kept her cow and carried on as cheerfully as possible but by 1935 she was penniless. The first East Kootenay Public Health Nurse assisted her to apply for relief. She lived in Fort Steele for 51 years, leaving only when taken to St. Eugene's Hospital, Cranbrook where she died at age seventy five... a female pioneer at Fort Steele.



Groundwater

Major new projects in the Wasa Lake area now appear to be somewhat stalled. A recent rezoning application was turned down on the basis that it is not known whether there is sufficient groundwater available to support development.

Concerned about the long-term viability of our community, we asked Area E representative Jane Walter to ask the RDEK to conduct a much needed groundwater aquifer study. She was told that there was no funding available to the RDEK for such a study. If the RDEK were to conduct such a study on its own it would mean a tax increase for the Wasa area residents, an unpalatable option.

Jane brought this information back to the WLLID and told us that the WLLID was in a much better position to request funding from senior levels of government and other sources and asked that we take the lead in looking for funding for a comprehensive groundwater study. The board of the WLLID agreed to sponsor a volunteer committee from the Wasa community to spearhead the project and its funding. The Regional District has offered to assist in the creation of any applications for funding to senior government sources. The Columbia Basin Trust also has resource people to help prepare funding applications.

One member of the business community has already agreed to join the committee and we are recruiting members from as broad a crosssection of the Wasa community as are willing to participate. One of the early tasks of the committee would be to determine what scope of study would need to be done to definitively answer the question of how much ground water is available. 
Flood Control Structure on Cameron Pond

In late June as the level of the Kootenay River rose, the water was rising a bit each day on Wasa Lake and Cameron Pond. But on Canada Day, the water just kept rising on Cameron Pond, threatening to drown Wendy's vegetable garden. There is an outlet culvert on the south end of Cameron Pond with a flood control gate on the downstream end, which is the responsibility of the WLLID. This culvert had a long extension piece reaching out into Cameron Pond on the upstream end, the inlet end of which had popped up above the water, effectively stopping any outflow from the pond, which is steadily fed by Lewis Creek. Once the extension was removed, the water level over the next few days went back to its normal level.

We engaged John Armstrong, a consulting engineer to advise us on what we should do to repair the failure and with what urgency. After a site visit he determined that erosion around the remaining part of he culvert was not causing an urgent situation and repairs could be done in the fall when the water was lower. He gave us several alternatives and we chose the cheapest: to create a headwall out of sand bags filled with a sand-cement mixture around the Cameron Pond inlet end of the remaining culvert. We have sent in the required notification form, location map and hand drawn construction sketch to the Ministry of the Environment, and are awaiting their response.

The first step in the repair will be to lower the level of Cameron Pond by about 6 or 8 inches using a second culvert with a gate valve on it just to the east of the main culvert. This will leave the main culvert above water so we can do the work on it. Ducks Unlimited, who manage the area downstream of Cameron Pond for the Nature Conservancy are encouraging us to do the work this fall as most of the waterfowl have wisely headed south and weather permitting, this is our plan.

Since engineering is expensive, the bill so far is north of \$4,000.00, our plan is to keep the construction cost down by doing the repair with volunteer labour and equipment. If you aren't allergic to the working end of a shovel and would like to volunteer for about half a day of manual labour, please contact Clay Tippett claytippett@gmail.com. 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

The Tri-Village Buzz asked our Area E Director Candidates the following question:

As in many rural communities throughout BC, business opportunities and employment opportunities are pretty limited. How would you change this phenomenon in Area E?

Sharon Mielnichuk answered...

"I would like to say that I would work very hard to bring business and employment opportunities to Area E so that everyone could prosper and have a good life. But lets be realistic. Local governments do not have the jurisdiction that other levels of government have to create employment or business opportunities. Local governments can make decisions in a very limited area or jurisdiction: the services it provides, land zoning decisions, and municipal taxation levels.

The workforce today is very mobile and can often make decisions on where they are going to live first and the job they want later. Often the family lives in one community and the wage earner works in another, miles away. Living and working from a home based business in one community and commuting to other centers to meet with clients is also very doable.

Families are making life style choices that require a level of services, consumer needs, medical needs, education, and recreation.

Businesses need to be close to resources and infrastructure that would support their activities.

Since becoming interested in Area E politics I know of three rural businesses that have been negated because rural residents were against the rezoning to allow these businesses to start.

What I would do is work with people to find the balance of interests so that lifestyles can be maintained while allowing business interests to develop that in turn would create employment opportunities.

Working with federal and provincial levels of government to access programs and dollars would also be a priority."

Jane Walter answered...

As in other areas of British Columbia, we are always searching for business opportunities to come to Area E. Area E is a very diverse area that provides potential for many businesses to prosper, such as Tourism, Agricultural, Home Business, Forestry, Mining and petroleum, Hospital and medical centers, Schools and the college and land use (building business and homes) within the official community plan.

Part of a Director's job is to listen to what the residents want to have in their community and to encourage people to provide those opportunities. One of those needs that people have mentioned is better internet services. This service is needed for many businesses to thrive and would be an asset to area E in encouraging potential new residents to relocate to our area permanently. Having High Speed Internet available would also be an incentive for other businesses who would wish to move into our area as well.

Another area that I am working on is trying to find solutions on making the agricultural business more profitable, there are many restrictions that have caused a real hardship on the people in agriculture.

As a Director I have worked on helping groups find funding to maintain their parks and trails. This helps the tourism industry.

Although the Rural Kimberley Official Community Plans states that the residents prefer that the industrial businesses be located in Kimberley, or just outside the city. This question will be asked when you are creating your Official Community Plan for Wasa, Ta Ta Creek Skookumchuck and Sheep Creek. This will advise the current Director and Board of what the residents want in their area.

If I am approached about any opportunity for a new business I will work with them in any way that I am able to as a Director, I realize that we need more young people in many of our areas, job creation would encourage them to move to our area. But remember that ultimately it is the residents that live in the area that will have the final say of what type of businesses or industry they want.

Jim Westwood answered...

"I would like to see a comprehensive survey via round table discussions with the consultants from each community in Area E.

My goal is to turn the rural area into a viable economy, with a harmonious society and sustainable environment that would be in line with the rural area.

There are 4 major objectives as I see them:

- 1. Encouraging young families to move into our area;
- 2. Creating more economic opportunities;
- 3. Improving the living standards of people in Area E;
- 4. Governing the rural area in an efficient and sustainable manner.


