Wood Stove Safety

I love our woodstove in the winter. The colour of the flames flickering behind the glass, the smell each time the door is opened to throw another log in. There is comfort in the crackling sound of a wood-burning fireplace or stove on a cold winter's night. But warm and cozy can quickly turn dangerous, destructive and deadly if your wood-burning unit is not properly installed or regularly maintained.

Preventive maintenance is always the best - we all know that, but do we always follow the correct steps?

When installing a woodstove, situate it on a non-combustible surface such as a tile floor.

Adequate ventilation is very important for preventing carbon monoxide poisoning.

Make sure that a door or window is easily accessible from your wood-burning area.

Consult a professional about proper installation of stove pipes.

If you are using a fireplace, regularly have the chimney cleaned and serviced by a professional.

Keep an area of at least one metre around the stove or fireplace clear of anything that might catch fire or overheat.

Install a heat shield behind or beside the stove to prevent heat damage to any nearby walls.

Before lighting your fireplace or wood-stove, open the damper to allow for good airflow. Keep the damper open until the fire is out and the ashes are cool enough to touch.

Build your fire with a small amount of dry, seasoned wood to keep the flames under control. Resist the temptation to overload your fireplace or stove. Burning too much wood at once can cause tar and creosote to build up in your chimney or stove pipes, which creates a fire hazard.

Never use highly flammable materials such as wrapping paper or gasoline in a woodstove or fireplace. These substances can create dangerous fireballs in an instant and, just like burning too much wood at once, can cause a buildup

If you watch them in the back yard, they are exploring the boundaries of the yard. As they get older, the boundaries expand to climbing a mountain or exploring the bottom of a lake. The need to see what's ahead will always be there. The advancements that have been made in the last 60 years, even in the last 20 years its mind boggling.

So here we are heading into December and I don't know about you, but I find the older I get, the faster the years go by. I'm sure it was only a couple months ago I was talking about a brand new year and yet here we are, soon to say goodbye to another year. As far as space goes, it was a productive year as the James Webb Telescope was launched and started sending back never before seen images and although its in the process now, the upcoming Artemis missions are preparing to send people to the moon by 2024 and then possibly Mars by 2027. I was too young to understand what was happening when the first moon landing took place, but I will be watching the skies when it happens next time. I'm pretty sure its going to take a while to get to the little piece of rock that was once a planet named Pluto, and still is in my books, cause how can you not call it a planet with a name like Pluto.



That being said, Pluto was discovered in 1930, and rumor has it, Walt Disney named Mickey's beloved dog Pluto (also introduced in 1930) as a tribute to the newly discovered planet. Pluto is about 1400 miles wide, or about 2/3 the size of the moon. It orbits the sun at around 3.6 billion miles away and a year is approximately 248 earth years oh and a day is about 156 hours with no overtime;). Even tho its not a planet anymore, it is classed as a dwarf planet and has 5 moons. One of its moons (Charon) is almost the same size and it has been discovered that these two orbit each other, like a double planet. The only spacecraft to see Pluto up close was NASA's New horizons in 2015 and sent back images that had scientists rethinking everything they

thought they new about the tiny planetoid. It also takes 288 minutes or 4.8 hours for light from the sun to reach Pluto, which could also be the reason for it being so cold like -400F burrrr put another log on the fire eh.

Dec 8 - Full Moon. Last full moon of the year and its also known as Cold Mooncause its really cold out there at this time. Long Nights Moon and Moon Before Yule are other names....... Drift Clearing Moon, Frost Exploding Trees Moon, Moon of the Popping Trees, Hoar Frost Moon, Snow Moon and Winter Maker Moon are other names I found for this moon.


Dec 8 - Mars at Opposition. The red planet will be at its closest approach to earth and will be visible all night long. Have your telescopes and cameras ready.

Dec 13,14 - Geminids Meteor Shower. The Geminids is the king of the meteor shower as it can produce up to 120 multicolored meteors per hour at its peak. It is produced from debris left behind by an asteroid known as 3200 Phaethon, which was discovered in 1982. The shower runs annually from Dec 7-17 and peaks on the evening of the 13th.

Dec 21 - Solstice. The south pole will be tilted towards the sun and will have reached its southern most position over the tropic of Capricorn giving the south its first day of summer and giving us our first day of winter. But the days will start getting longer....yay.

Dec 21,22 - Ursids Meteor Shower. This is a minor shower producing around 5-10 meteors per hour and is a result of dust grains left behind from comet Tuttle, which was discovered in 1790. This shower runs annually from Dec 17-25 and peaks on the evening of the 21st.

So there you have it folks. All the space information you could ask for wrapped up in a nice little X-mas basket. I would

of flammable materials in your chimney or stove pipes.

Always use a screen in front of the fireplace, and never leave children unattended by a fire.

Have a fire escape plan for your house and regularly review it with your family.

Keep a working fire extinguisher in an accessible location.

Check your smoke detectors monthly, and replace the batteries as necessary. You should also have a carbon monoxide detector in your sleeping quarters to alert you if there is a buildup of the deadly gas. Carbon monoxide buildup can occur if the area around your wood-burning unit is inadequately ventilated. Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning can include headaches and nausea. If your carbon monoxide detector goes off, get out of the building immediately and find out what needs to be done to correct the ventilation problem.

With the holiday season fast approaching, remember to take decorations such as stockings off the fireplace before use.


If you have a real Christmas tree, water it regularly and keep it a safe distance away from your woodstove and any open flames.

Be responsible and use common sense. Avoid being intoxicated or impaired when around fire. Never leave your house or go to bed when a fire is still burning.

When it's time to clean the ashes out of the fireplace or wood-stove, wait until they are completely cool and scoop them into a metal bucket; never place the ashes in a plastic or cardboard container. It can take up to three days for embers and ashes to completely cool.

Exercise due care and enjoy staying toasty by your fireplace or woodstove this winter!

How Volunteers Are Making a Difference in Wasa. Submitted by Susanne Ashmore

Its interesting how ideas and programs can enhance the livability of a community. Also, how climate change can change our lives and force us to pivot. For Wasa the pivot is the potential for fire and flood.

I thought about this on a cold November morning when I attended a field trip in the area above Wasa with representatives of the Wasa Wildfire Risk Reduction Project, (Ministry of Forests - Stewardship Forester, habitat and forestry consultants providing technical mapping) We have been incredibly lucky that a few years ago a group of volunteers formed a Fire Smart initiative. Today's field trip would not have happened without this lead. In fact, at a public meeting in the fall residents from Lazy Lake asked how they cold get a Risk Reduction project. The answer, change must start at a community level for government to trust that a program like Wasa's will have buy in.

Coincidentally the day after the field trip I read an article titled: 'Do you really Want to Rebuild at 80?' Rethinking Where to Retire. It's a small yet noticeable shift, experts say — but climate change is causing retirees to start reconsidering moves to disaster-prone dream locales. A small but growing number of older people are taking climate change into account when choosing a retirement destination, real estate agents and other experts say. Armed with climate studies, many retirees are looking for communities that are less likely to experience extreme weather events, such as wildfires, drought, and flooding.



The article chronicled a story about a retiring couple selling properties in flood and fire prone areas and buying in an area not as affected by climate change.

Wasa is already taking a lead in making our community more climate resilient. This Risk Reduction Project is balancing the needs of public safety while providing wildlife corridors, and healthy forest eco systems. The aspect of future real estate values as part of this volunteer, government initiative is another win for our community.

WASA VOLUNTEER FIRE PREVENTION & SUPPRESSION

As 2022 comes to an end, volunteers are already preparing for next year's FireSmart activities.

By the end of 2023, the FireSmart Demonstration Site, on the corner of Wasa Lake Park Drive and School Road, will be complete with a path and interpretive signage showing examples of what FireSmart looks like, and how easy it is to accomplish. The site is intended to serve as an educational centre to help homeowners learn how they can apply the principals of wildfire hazard reduction to their own properties. Volunteers will spend the winter planning the interpretive signage and making arrangements for installation over the summer.

As you may re-

call from last month's Buzz article, the Regional District of East Kootenay and BC Wildfire Service are developing a plan to help reduce the wildfire hazard in the forests that surround us. On November 17, a member of the Volunteer Fire Prevention Board and several residents met with representatives of the Wasa Wildfire Risk Reduction Project to take a walk around some of the proposed treatment areas. More news will be available at a public meeting in the spring which residents are very strongly encouraged to attend. It's everyone's responsibility to be not only well-informed, but also to provide input into the process.

I was informed that BC Hydro was going to turn off the two street lights at Wasa. After some discussion with the RDEK staff to find out who had requested BC Hydro to install the lights, we could not find any information.

I made the decision to apply for a grant to cover the costs for two years. The RDEK Board supported a Discretionary Grant-In-Aid a maximum of \$500.00 per year.

The two Street lights are located at the two intersections entering Wasa.

Eventually the RDEK will have to create a service area to pay for the electrical costs. When we are doing this process the RDEK will be asking if there is a need for these lights and if the residents would like to have more lights in other locations. E.G. where the school bus picks up or drops off the students.

TaTa Creek Tenure Application

I have been asked about a Recreation Tenure that had been applied for off road bikes in the TaTa creek area. This application was made several years ago. I have not heard the outcome, so I believe that they have not made a decision. I will be following up with the Ministry and will forward any information that I learn.

SONIA: When I was three and my sister was 5, I remember shortly before Christmas, our mom picked up two large parcels from Eaton's. We were so excited thinking the parcels were for us but mom said no they were for our Dad. Of course we wanted to know what was in the boxes. Mom told us it was a big tent and a sleeping bag. Mom said we were not to tell Dad.

When Dad came home from work we told him about the big boxes. He asked us what was in them and after a little persuading we whispered what they contained he was very happy!

When Christmas Eve came and it was time to open our presents, our dad said we may as well open his gifts since he already knew what was in them. Imagine our surprise when they contained a baby buggy for my sister and a doll stroller for me. We didn't usually get a lot for Christmas and to get something we really wanted made it extra special.

IRENE: Coming from Germany, my parents brought with them many wonderful Christmas traditions. One of my favorites happens on Dec. 6th. The night before, my sister and I would clean and polish our shoes and leave them by the door. If the shoes were clean enough and you had been good all year, St. Nicholas would come and leave oranges, mixed nuts and possibly a few candies in the shoes. If not—A LUMP OF COAL!!

This would signify the beginning of all the wonderful things that led up to the magic that is Christmas. Makes me feel warm and fuzzy inside to this day.

SUSAN: I loved Christmas time with my family. One of my favorite memories comes from when I was quite young. The war was over, Dad was discharged from the Navy and he had a job at Acme Press in Victoria. Money was not in abundance in those days so alcohol was certainly not a staple in our home. My dad loved candy and so he had a stash in his closet. Chocolate snowballs, chocolate covered marachino cherries and licorice allsorts!! These candies were well out of reach of our little hands! He doled them out to my brother and I like they were gold. Perhaps one choice a week!!

Acme Press would have an office party shortly before Christmas and there was alcohol at the party. My dad would arrive home in a cab with his gifts from the boss and of course the gifts were boxes of his favorite candies. Dad would come into the house, put the candy on the living room carpet, take off the lids and in a most jovial voice say, "Help yourselves my little ones. Merry Christmas." A wonderful time for us kids to be sure. It would not be long before Dad would make his way to bed and mom would scoop up the boxes of candies and up they would go to the top shelf in Dad's closet. This story brings a smile to me even today!!

NICKY: Years and years ago bridal showers were very different from today's affairs. Nobody had store registries except for china and crystal. Showers were commonly put on by the community and all the ladies came. The gifts were ever so practical. At the end of it all the young bride would have the beginnings of a well stocked kitchen. BRANDIED PEACHES (The Best of Bridge)

1 28 ounce tin of peach halves (796 ml)

2 Tbs. syrup from the peaches

½ cup brown sugar

1/4 tsp. cinnamon

½ cup brandy

Drain peaches, reserving 2 Tbs. syrup. Place in shallow baking dish. Combine all ingredients and spoon over the peaches. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes, basting occasionally. Serve over vanilla ice cream or with a teaspoon of whipped cream or sour cream in each centre. Garnish with fresh grated nutmeg.

FLAG ETIQUETTE

We have a beautiful flag. Simple and straight forward, like many Canadians tend to be. So its appropriate that we be reminded how to respect the symbol of our country.

The manner in which flags may be displayed in Canada is not governed by legislation but by established practice and convention. Flag etiquette is an adaptation of international usage and customs that the federal government has observed for many years. Given the important symbolism of flags, they should always be treated with respect.

- The National Flag of Canada may be flown day and night and does not need to be lighted while flying after sundown.
- The National Flag must be flown at all federal government buildings, airports, as well as military bases and establishments within and outside Canada.
- When flown horizontally, the National Flag is flown with the maple leaf pointing upwards.
- When hung vertically, the flag should be placed so that the upper part of the leaf points to the left, from the point of view of the observer facing the flag.
- The National Flag will always be flown on its own flagpole, with the sleeve nearest to the pole. The
 - canton should be placed in the position nearest the top of the flagpole or mast. It is improper to fly the National Flag with another flag, of any type, on the same flagpole.
- The place of honour for flying a car pennant is on the front right fender (passenger's side). This is where the National Flag should be displayed when it is flown alone. It should be noted that only the Prime Minister may use the National Flag of Canada as a distinguishing flag on a vehicle.
- The National Flag, when carried, is never dipped or lowered to the ground. There is no occasion during which the National Flag is dipped.
- The government of Canada's rules for flying the national flag say the flag should never be flown upside down except as a signal of distress in instances of extreme danger to life, and should also never be used to cover a statue.






